- the verbal properties and their decisive role in the interpretation of deverbal/synthetic compounds in English (publication items #2 & #5);
- the semantic properties of psychological verbs and their argument alternations in Greek, Romanian and English (publication item #9);
- negative concord as polyadic quantification, acknowledging the negative semantics of negative concord items in an underspecified semantics (publication item #8).
